EVERY CHRISTIAN A MISSIONARY

Vernon D. Anderson

Several years ago we were driving through the streets of a small Mid-Western city. Of particular interest were the churches in the city. I commented to our hostdriver about so many churches. I pointed to several corners where churches were directly across from one another. Then he added that at some points in the city you would see churches on all four corners of one intersection! In most American cities one finds Christian churches only blocks apart. In driving through the countryside, every town and hamlet has a church or two, perhaps several.

In contrast we traveled into the Central Province of Ceylon recently. We drove about 153 miles and in all this total 153 miles I did not see one Protestant church! We passes through town after town and village after village finding no chapel built for Protestant worship. Yet I saw a great number of

Buddhist temples, and Buddhist priests were in abundance. The dramatic contrast with that U.S. Mid-Western city depresses me.

The United States has multitudes of churches, pastors, Sunday school teachers, evangelists and Christian lay leaders. Yet a cry is raised that there are so many in the States who have never had the gospel explained to them. How can this be? The answer is tragic but simple. Every Christian is not a missionary. I dogmatically and enthusiastically believe and teach that every Christian should be a missionary. If every regenerated Christian were a true missionary, in one week everyone who needs an explanation of the well-known gospel in the U.S. would be fully aware of its claims. In Ceylon it is a different story. The manpower is lacking. There are not enough Christians in Ceylon to evangelize Ceylon.

The United States has Christian manpower. Many prospective pastors hold secular jobs. Churches having one pastor in the pulpit often have several in the pews. Bible college graduates are teaching one hour Sunday school classes instead of establishing new fulltime works. Manpower is abundantly available, but it is dormant, in reserve. Thousands of believers work beside non-Christians year after year without giving them a gospel tract or explaining the way of salvation. There are numbers of Christians who scorn tract distributing or personally explaining the way of salvation to strangers they daily contact— it makes them uncomfortable.

On the foreign field we emphasize teaching that every true believer in Christ is a missionary. This is essential also in the States. If a believer is not a missionary, he is wandering outside the will of God. Paul was a missionary; no one doubts it. He pleaded, "Be ye followers of me." He commanded, "Do the work of an evangelist (missionary)." There is no excusing oneself nor reasoning away before God for not being a missionary. Even Moses cried, "Would to God that all the Lord's people were prophets!" Numbers 11:29.

Is a personal revelation or an audible call necessary for missionary service? Most are thus conveniently delayed by the devil. Every believer at the moment of salvation's call hears also the missionary call begin to sound. The first reaction and healthiest symptom of sins forgiven is: "I must tell someone else!"

Christiandom is failing to evangelize the world for the simple rea-

son that Christendom has not seen its universal calling. Too many are leaning on the comfortable prop of Satan, "I was not called." To this we say, "We (all of us) are ambassadors (missionaries) for Christ." But you say, "A foreign Ambassadors are missionary?" 'foreign' missionaries. home is Heaven of which we are here ambassadors, representatives of Heaven, Inc. The world is our territory. How complacent and settled we are in the States. We forget that this is not to be home. We rather resemble "squatters", all claiming the same piece of land when beyond us lies a wide and virgin expanse relatively untouched by the Master's claims.

It is not a matter of being a worker in the U.S. in opposition to a missionary in Africa or Indonesia. We all are missionaries to all the world. In this present dispensation of God's grace, we are not to recognize nations. We like Paul must go to the neediest places and preach the gospel where Christ is not named lest we merely overlap, building on the other man's foundation, all of which clearly points to the regions beyond us. Successful missions is not a slow expansion along our borders but a long-range gospel attack on all regions hitherto unreached. Not only this, but we dare not linger in those places where people have hardened their hearts to the gospel. "Get thee quickly out of Jerusalem for they will not receive thy testimony concerning me", Paul heard the Lord's command.

We further believe that every person should be a missionary to the neediest places. No, all cannot go physically to a land beyond

TWENTIETH CENTURY FLAGELLANTS

We are in the suburbs of Manila. The year is 1959. A thousand people are crowding along a narrow river path to see the Flagellants. In the muddy river water a skilled torturer washes his sharp tools. One that I examined carefully is composed of a flat board into which are set, in three rows, nine sharp pieces of broken beer bottles.

Presently the professional torturer makes his way to a group encircling one of the Flagellants, or, shall we say, one of the victims. The latter has already begun the ordeal by rhythmically whipping his naked skin with a whip ending with a cluster of short rods. Presently he bares his back to receive four blows with that wicked board and its razor-sharp glass.

Now, renewing the rhythmic beating of his back, he makes his way through the circle of onlookers. Others join him to form a gruesome and bloody procession along the river dike leading to the sea.

The continuous rhythmic swinging of cruel whips on those crimson backs is a fearful sight. Looking back, we see other victims going through whipping ordeals preparatory to having their backs lacerated with the instrument containing the broken glass.

Then we see the climax of this awful rite. A blindfolded youth stands stripped to the waist, baring his back to the lacerating torturer. Whereas most of the other victims have only their backs cut, this young man is also struck by the torturer on his breasts and legs. Then, as the blood flows freely in response to the rhythmic

blows inflicted by his two "assistants", he walks away down the river path carrying his cross. We follow. The long procession leads to a small Roman Catholic Church.

What we behold is unbelievable. As if it were not enough for the victims to walk a long half mile beating their bloody backs, now they are lying prone on the dusty road while "assistants" beat them with leather whips.

We can stand it no longer, so we make our way through the alleys of the village to the tidal river to see the finish of the long ordeal. One after another the bloodied victims walk into the dirty salt water to wash their wounds.

Naturally we wonder why men go through such ordeals. On inquiring, we learn that they are fulfilling vows made to God to secure healing or some other blessings. But we can hardly reconcile this torture of the human body with I Corinthians 6:19: "What? Know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost...and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's."

(Ed. Note: With such conditions existing in the Philippines, is it not clear that these people need to know the message of God's Grace? The aim of the Things to Come Mission in the Philippines is to make known that Christ has shed His blood and this act of God is sufficient to cleanse all men of their sin and to bring them into the presence of God having the righteousness of Christ. II Corinthians 5:21: "For he (God) hath

made him (Christ) to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him."

Pray for and uphold the American missionaries and the National pastors as they minister to these people, who are enslaved to Satan, that they may be saved from this condition and brought into the family of God.)

U. S. borders. Nevertheless we can all go. No person is exempt. The mother who trains up missionary sons and daughters is going. The man who labors overtime to send extra gifts is going. The widow who kneels long in fervent prayer is going. The pastor who leads and challenges his people to give, go and pray missions is going. The Sunday school teacher who inspires her children with world missions past and present is going. The Bible school leaders charging their students for the mission fields are going. All who truly sacrifice are going.

It is reasonable for us to keep on emphasizing countries outside the U.S. for evangelization. They are the neglected places and they are the places where the need remains greatest. They are not easy mission fields but the most difficult. The physical obstacles are many, but no greater than those endured by Paul, the first missionarv. See I Cor. 4 and 2 Cor. 11. Paul is not here complaining, but he is seeking to pierce the hardened hearts of the Corinthians so they can share the burdens of those preachers travelling to far countries. He wants the Corinthians to share his own trials in prayers, gifts and in manpower.

If you are a Christian— you are a missionary! You are a Christian if you have trusted Christ as Saviour. You may not be acting like a Christian but God's promise to you does not change. You may not be fulfilling your job as a missionary, but your calling in God's sight has not changed. Paul said, "Walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ve are called." It is your reward to live up to your missionary calling. Once you start doing the work of a missionary in your present circle, your vision will quickly broaden to envelop the world. When you care about the distant soul in his half-naked savagery, you'll care about every welldressed. educated American great deal more! When the spiritual fate of India is real to you, the spiritual fate of America is even more real. A true missionary sees the world with eyes of spiritual compassion, the love of Christ.

As you make your honest effort to find your place in world missions, God will lead you to your place of service. God only leads a moving object. When you stand still, how can God lead you? Even if He turns you around, you remain standing still. God led and directed Paul because he was moving. You start moving right now to evangelize the lost world and God will lead you by a way you thought impossible. Remember that your God is a Worker of Miracles- do not be always leaning on cold statistics but be always bounding forward with the wings of faith. Dare to be the missionary God has called you to be!

THE GREATER LIGHT SHINETH IN THE GLOOMY HEART

Like the Apostle Paul's life, I was taught the Doctrine of Judaism as I lived with my uncle, a Seventh Day Adventist, from age six until seventeen years old. Being a Law-fearing proselyte, I had presumed that apart from observing the seventh day Sabbath and dietary regulation, we could never be saved and thus sure to enter Hell. I believed that to observe Sunday instead of Saturday was the mark of the Beast. This is in contrast to Paul's Gospel of Grace. He calls this falling from Grace in Galatians 5:4.

From my eighteenth until my twenty-fifth year, I lived with my sister and attended the United Church of Christ of the Philippines. After I married, I moved to Alecia in 1950, and joined with the Christian Missionary Alliance Church, for there was no other Protestant Church in Alecia at that time. While attending the Alliance Church, my Catholic wife was converted and baptized in the sea. (We had no Jordan River where John was baptizing) After the baptism, the miraculous sign that followed was she got a cold and fever.

By the guidance of the Holy Spirit, I came to invite Brother P. Undag to be one of the speakers for a five day revival. God responded, and Brother P. Undag came with Brother Vernon Anderson. They taught five days in the church and presented the Dispensational method of Bible study, which was new to us. Their first

text was II Timothy 2:15, rightly dividing the Word of God. The first two days' teachings were new to me and a secret debate arose in my mind. After the fifth day of Bible Study, I was convinced, enlightened, and all my doubts were banished. This was the first time I really grasped the Bible truth. Gradually my verse to verse mixing and connecting method of teaching and preaching was changed to rightly dividing the Word of Truth. I remembered Genesis 1:16, that God made the greater light to rule the day. I had received light in the Alliance church, but this was a gloomy light. Thanks be to God for giving me a greater light to rule my gloomy knowledge of the Bible by using the key for Bible Study found in II Timothy 2:15.

My life was one of Law first, then mixing Law and Grace, and now it is pure, unadulterated Grace as revealed by the Apostle Paul. Praise the Lord the Truth of the Bible and the spread of the Gospel of God's Grace is being advanced by the Things to Come Mission missionaries and workers, in spite of some physical weaknesses.

I have been informed from the reports of other T.C.M. workers that their places have been infested by rats. I thought my place was the only part of the Islands that was damaged by them. It is my prayer that the farmers and others will not only beware of the rats, but will beware of the great wrath of God against their sin, and that

they will receive Christ as their Personal Saviour.

My present field of work is in Benangonan, Floreda, Alecia and Dawadawa. My time is divided between these churches. These places are some distance from each other and reached by the sea. It takes much time and hard work to paddle to my destination. There are no regular trips by motor boats or other water transportation. It is my prayer that the Lord will supply an outboard motor for my boat so as to make this traveling faster. This motor is an urgent need and I would ask you to pray about it, as it would be a real help in the Lord's work in these places.

I would ask you to pray for the work and that the Lord will provide my livlihood. Many times Satan has tempted me to quit the Lord's work in order to provide subsistence for my family. I planned to farm in order to maintain my work for the Lord, but it would leave me no time to study and search the Scriptures in order that I would be able to teach and preach to these people here. The churches here are young and tender in the faith and need gentle, gradual and proper care. The spirit of Job's wife often times grows in the mind of my wife because of the shortage of food and physical covering. However, I thank the Lord God our Saviour that He giveth me always ardent spirit for His work.

Not long ago I attended the church in Floreda and they are meeting every Sunday and the brethren are preparing material for a new chapel. For this we do praise the Lord. At the end of that same month I was in Alecia to encourage the weak brethren to

ACTIVITY IN MACEDONIA

I am now in Drama, on my third evangelistic trip. Drama is one of the largest cities of Macedonia, the land of Alexander the Great. My first trip took me to Chios (Island) the second trip was to Sparta, and now here to Drama.

I came here after an invitation from a dear Christian friend. He has been saved and has served the Lord for ten years. His life is a blessed one and he has a great testimony among the Greek Protestants in this area. When I arrived we had prayer together and I knew that this was the leading of the Lord for me to be here. We could not freely advertise our meetings, but by having a Bible study in the home of my friend, we could invite friends to come and share in the blessings of the Lord as we read the Bible together. From the Bible studies we had the opportunity to present the way of salvation and at first we had only five persons attending and later more came to study with us. Of these we led ten souls to the Lord for salvation and later we had the joy of seeing five more receive salvation and come into a knowledge of sins forgiven through the Blood of Christ. There are now fifteen souls standing for the Truth of God's Word here in Drama. We meet every Wednesday and Sunday, asking the Lord's blessing as we study the Bible together. When I leave to return to Athens, I will leave my dear friend in charge of this group of believers. How we do thank the Lord for men like this who are willing to serve the Lord and teach His Word.

I explained to him about the Things to Come Mission and about my desire to travel all over Greece preaching the Gospel of the Grace of God. He is willing to do his all to further the spread of the Gospel of God's Grace.

While here I have gone into all the area around Drama holding meetings and looking over the area for future evangelistic work. In the city of Doxaton, the Mayor of the town invited me to talk to the people outside the Town Hall. The Mayor is a very well educated man and he reads the Bible. He is just about to enter into the promises of God and accept Jesus as his personal Saviour. Pray that I might be able to speak with him again before I leave Drama, and that he will open his heart and accept Christ into his life.

One of the places I visited was Phillipi (Acts 16:12). Believe me dear brother, if ever you visit here, you too will hear that voice which the Apostle Paul heard (Acts 16:b), "Come over into Macedonia, and help us." Today, just as then, these people need the light of the Gospel. In Philippi, as in other biblical cities here, you can find all the things that the world has to offer; but the Spirit of God is not to be seen anywhere. As I look at these people I feel a great responsibility. I'm Greek and have

received from God the same blessed truth that the Apostle Paul brought to these people years ago. I too. feel that this message should be made known to these people who have gone away from God and are looking to the Churches, the Priests, the Pictures and all the other articles which can never save As I walked through the ruins of this biblical city, I could almost feel as if I were in that Apostolic period and wanted to talk to Lydia and the keeper of the prison. They are not here but their descendants are here and I must tell them of Christ's death for their sins and encourage them to accept Jesus as their saviour from sin. Pray that the Lord will raise up other Lydias and men like the prison keeper who will be able to reach others with the Gospel and will be workers for God and not servants of the devil.

In a few days we will be leaving Drama and head for Salonica to look over that area, then back to Athens. As we travel we distribute tracts and New Testaments everywhere. Pray that these will be used of the Lord to win souls to Himself.

BLESSINGS AND PROBLEMS

I have just recently returned from my visit to Brazil. I was there for five weeks and can report that the work there is going along well and the prospect of future work is very good. I visited about twelve cities and some towns in order to have a true outlook for the work in Brazil and found the people very attentive and open to the Gospel. In some places I preached to about three thousand people and several accepted the Lord as their personal

saviour when I gave the invitation. My only regret was that I didn't have any literature on the Message of God's Grace in the Portuguese language. This need of translating some of the Grace material into the Portuguest language is urgent and we must work to this end in the near future.

In visiting the works of Brother Schmidt I found three established works where the doctrinal teaching is well established. The work in Boquerao has about twelve members now, the work in Litoral among the fishers is about sixty and the new work in Santa Cruz has only about fifteen members. The work in Boquerao did have about forty members, but some moved from the area to find work and others were attracted to another church which has a regular building to meet in. It is hard for Brother Schmidt as they are meeting in a room of his house and this is not adequate to hold services for the people.

From my travels, I found that Argentina is not as well evangelized as Brazil. One example is the city of Monte where we plan to open a new work soon. It is about 107 miles from Buenos Aires with a population of 55,000 and they have no Evangelical Church of any kind. I saw nothing of this kind in all Brazil.

Speaking of Monte, we are in prayer for and have a real desire to open a work there before some false Cult opens a work there and deceives these people. We need to find a place to hold our meetings and then to have the funds to rent it.

On my return to Villa-Diamante, I found the work was going along very well under the direction of

Brother Koroluk. He has given proof of his zeal and interest in the Lord's work and I was thrilled to know that during my absence four persons accepted the Lord as their saviour under the ministry of Brother Koroluk. I feel that I can leave to extend the work more often now that I have someone who can effectively handle the work here.

The work here in Villa-Diamante is growing every week with new people attending the services. In the past week, Sister Manuela Campanino brought three new persons. Of these was an educated lady and her daughter who had never attended a Gospel meeting before in their lives. The message made an impact on her heart and she promised to attend our services regularly. We are much in prayer that these new ones will accept the Lord as their saviour soon. Other members have invited their friends and co-workers to attend and we expect cthers to attend our services soon.

Last Sunday we had Brother Howard Keer, director of the Bible Institute of Rio de La Plata, as our guest speaker and he brought a very inspiring message. At the invitation, six persons responded and accepted the Lord as their saviour. Of those who accepted the Lord that night one was the husband of a sister who had prayed for his conversion for one and a half years. She was overjoyed that this prayer was answered. Another was the wife of a former Catholic man who was a delegate to Rome and who took the Hostia from the hands of Pope Pius XII. He was converted one week ago and brought his wife to this meeting where she was converted along with another Italian woman, a young man from Chile and two Argentinien. This night

was a real spiritual feast and we felt the presence of the Lord among us. Together with the blessings we also have problems. One of our recently converted women with her fourteen year old daughter have experienced a real test in their Christian life. This sister was deserted by her husband as a protest to their accepting the Lord as their saviour. They are firm in their decision to follow the Lord and we must help them to find some kind of a job for their existence. Please pray for this great need and for this couple, that their faith will be strengthened.

Another problem is that we do not have the needed space now and with added numbers we will have to extend our meeting room to accommodate the new ones. We are praying for a real spiritual revival here in the Buenos Aires area and we look forward to extending our work to other places. We want to go to Monte, Sister Mango is looking forward to going to Chacabuco City, the place of her birth, to see what can be done there for the spread of the Gospel. Pray for her and for this purpose.

Last month Brother Vernon Anderson with his daughter Hope and myself went to Oriental Negros. We held Bible Studies in three churches on this island. We also held open air meetings in the towns and barrios. Later in the month we went to one of the barrios to sclemnize a wedding and after the wedding Brother Anderson held an evangelistic meeting. There were many in attendance, about a hundred people, and six Roman Catholics were converted.

The first of this month Brother Anderson and Hope returned home and I, with Brother Serio Abrio, continued on to Mabinay, a barrio of Bais. We held an evangelistic meeting with many attending and the next day we proceeded to Lumbangan, a barrio about four kilometers from Mabinay. We held another evangelistic meeting in this barrio, but our meeting was not a success because of the rain.

On the fourth we held an open air meeting in the barrio of Dovgoan. About eighty persons were in attendance.

On the sixth and seventh, I with sixteen of our members from Caponay went to Labaclobacan, Giholngan. We traveled by foot on a muddy and rough trail about fourteen kilometers. We had a good meeting with the result that twelve Roman Catholics were converted and received Jesus Christ as their only Saviour.

Last month while in Molave to buy medicine for my children and for the Subanos, I met the pastor of a church of Manalo. He challenged me to a debate pertaining to the deity of Jesus Christ. We made arrangements to debate in Molave on the 28th and asked permission of the Mayor for a public debate and were granted a permit to hold the debate in the Molave Gym. Our subject was "Christ is not God according to the Scriptures". During the debate, when I cross examined the pastor Manalo, the people were shouting because his answers were not on the topic, and the people judged that he was defeated. The next day the Mayor gave me a permit to preach the Word of God for one year.

The first part of this month I went with my two children to Oroquieta to make preparations for them to attend school. I had to stay in Oroquieta three days due to financial problems for my children to attend school. On that Sunday I met Brother Potenciano Unday and we went to hold a service in the Provincial Jail with the pastor of the U.C.C.P. The prisoners were all interested and were attentive as Brother Poten delivered the message.

I returned to the mountain the next week to work with the native people and to teach them literacy and show them the way of salvaton.

On the 21st I went down to Molave to the office of the District Supervisor of Public Schools for the renewal of my permit to teach religious instruction in the public schools. The head teacher required me to have this new permit because the priest of the R. C. church was asking if I were attending to my responsibilities to the Government.

We thank God that during the religious class which my wife teaches, many Roman Catholic children are attending, although they were instructed not to attend the T.C.M. teaching. We pray the Lord will bless and work through us for His praise and glory.

After three months of floods, we are able once more to continue our work.

We are working in six cities and villages with some very promising places that we hope to be able to open centers soon.

In Aru va Palli, the members totalled only eleven for the past four months, but we praise the Lord for the joy of seeing souls born again. We rejoice now that there are seventeen members in this viliage.

One of the joys that I have received is the way the women are accepting the salvation of God. It is not easy to reach the women and we could do much more in this particular area if we had a woman who could work among the females in the different villages. We have been trying to get one of the sisters to do this. Do pray with us that this need will be filled.

We praise the Lord that the Gospel is once again going forward.
