



Grace at Ground Zero

We will never forget September 11, 2001. We witnessed two airplanes, loaded with passengers, fly into the two tallest buildings in the world. We also watched as these two buildings came crumbling down. We saw people running for their lives.

The things that brought sadness and concern on my part was not the building falling but that over 3000 lives went out into eternity in a matter of hours. These people came to work never expecting that they would never go home again to their loved ones. This brought to mind that spiritual truth that we should always be ready to meet the Lord – at any time. It is believing the gospel of God's wonderful grace [Christ's death, burial and resurrection 1 Cor. 15:1-4] that prepares us for this meeting.

I also began to wonder if there was a grace ministry in New York near this area. Then I thought about Dennis Kiszonas' ministry.

I have asked Dennis to write an article about his ministry. Please note that the mission field is New York City. I know the same exists in other large cities - Editor

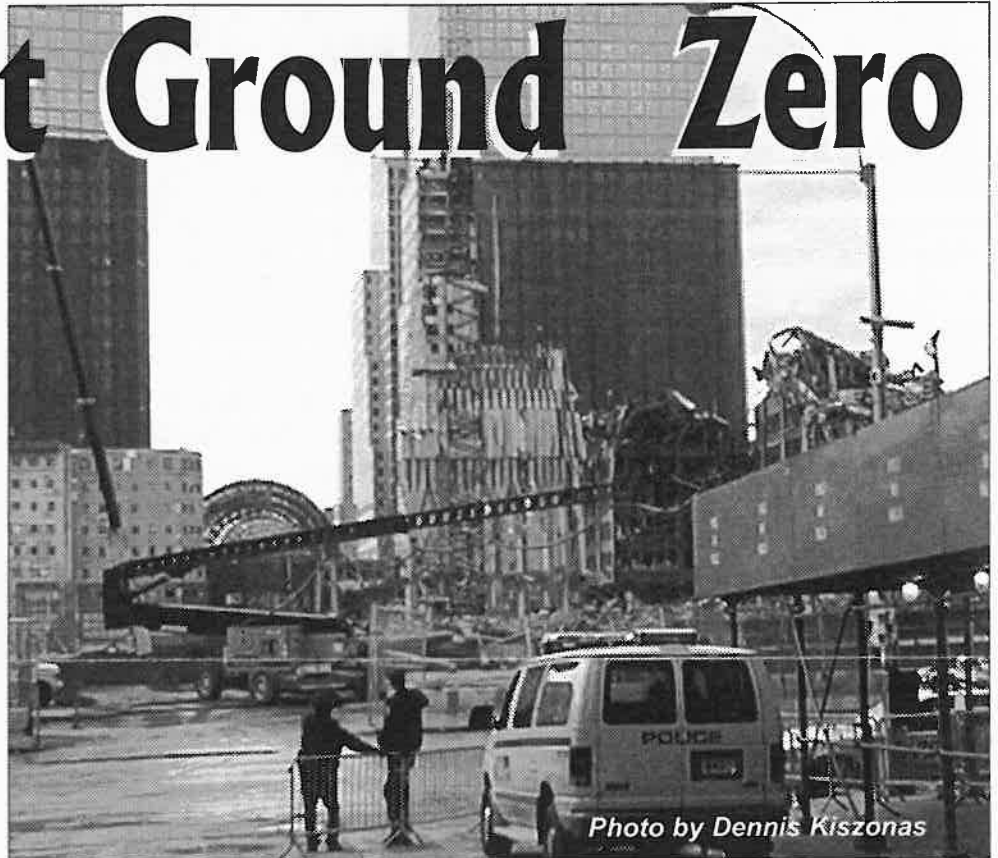

Dennis Kiszonas writes: I finally went to ground zero on December 11, three months to the day after the terrorist attack on the World Trade Center. In late September I flew over the site and looked down from the plane at the tangled heap of steel beams across the Hudson, but this was my first visit to the site where 3088 people (latest

estimate) lost their lives when the planes crashed into the Twin Towers. I had a hard time bringing myself to go there, and I know people who live in the neighborhood, almost in the shadow of the towers, who have such a sense of tragic loss that they

Why Support Nationals?

The words 'Rice Christians' have been used when talking about supporting nationals. These words are used to discourage the supporting of nationals; saying the nationals are preaching only for money and they don't really have the dedication to the ministry, or to the Lord. I don't agree with this thinking.

I don't deny that there have been some nationals who have ministered simply for money, but we also see some USA preachers profiting from the ministry as well, especially those on TV. They teach a health and wealth doctrine.

Let's look at what the Bible says. Are we Christians here in the US really independent? Don't we depend upon a broad-based group of Christians to support the many programs from which we benefit ... for instance, education in Christian schools, radio, TV, youth organizations, church-related seminars. The fact that these benefits happen to come from within the boundaries of the USA does not make us totally independent.

Should we treat Christians in other countries as foreigners who should be responsible for their own needs? The answer is simply "No." How can we make such a division when we know that the apostle Paul taught that the middle wall of partition was broken down.

And now, the only division that we have is between the saved and lost. We who are saved are all one in the Body of Christ and Christ is the Head. Romans 12:3-5

The illustration used is our physical body. Each member has a responsibility to help other members of the body. When this happens, then the Body can produce. 1 Corinthians 12:12-20

All Christians are part of the Body of Christ. The whole Body functions best when each part does its work with equal concern for one another. "There is one Body and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, One Faith, One Baptism, One God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in you all. But unto every one of us is given grace according to the measure of the gift of Christ." Eph. 4:4-7.

God has called some to the ministry. He has also called some to pray and support. When we work together we can reach a greater number of people with the gospel of the Grace of God.

Let's remember, we make no distinction between the national and USA nationals when we evangelize. We preach the same gospel to all men. When a person is saved, we should not divide between the nationals and the USA Christians since we all are one in

the Body of Christ.

Beginning in 1958 my ministry has been in the area of training nationals for the ministry and supporting them. I have seen many go out into the highways and byways preaching the Gospel of the Grace of God. Many have been saved and churches established through the ministry of these trained nationals because we worked together in the ministry. See page three for a letter I received from one of these nationals that I helped train. After reading this report you decide if it is right to help support nationals or help them in their ministry.

Sharing our resources, in the true biblical sense, means coming alongside – holding out a helping hand – sharing encouragement, finances, spiritual counsel and comfort with others.

We need wisdom and foresight to strengthen ties with national Christians, a sensitive spirit to share wisely with them, and compassion to want to work alongside them.

Nationals Organize New Ministries in Philippines

We have just had a wonderful and successful Youth Camp last Dec. 26-29 held at IGBI- Bataan. There were 106 campers and staff who participated in the camping with the theme "The Love of Christ." The three-day camping was filled with activities like Bible studies, games, singing, talent night, worship and commitment to the Lord. The campers as well as the staff really enjoyed the fellowship in the camp.

Churches in Central Luzon are organized into the "Central Luzon Association of Grace Churches" also known as "CLAG." We have churches in the provinces of Cavite, Laguna, Bataan, Zambales and Metro Manila. The CLAG supports the Kids, Youth, Adults, Bible School and Bible Training ministries.

Kids Ministry—We have an annual kids camp held in the month of May at IGBI-Bataan. Vacation Bible School is also conducted in churches and selected areas in Central Luzon and Metro Manila during the months of April and May. Further, we are also involved in the training of our Sunday school teachers.

Youth Ministry—Young People in Central Luzon and Metro Manila are divided into four districts. Each district meets once every two months for various activities. The four districts meet quarterly for fellowship. An Annual

Youth Conference is held in March or April and Youth Camp every December held in IGBI-Bataan.

Adult Ministry—Adults have their fellowship once every two months. The Annual Workers' seminar is held in November.

Bible Training Ministry—We are conducting Bible training for our members who cannot attend a regular resident Bible school. We are conducting it every Sunday from 4:00 – 8:00 PM. As of now, there are 25 – 30 who are regularly attending the training. Some of these trainees are already pastoring a church.

IGBI-Bataan's Ministry—Last year we opened our regular Bible School in

Bataan. We have six students in the second semester. We are expecting more first-year students to enroll next school year. We need to construct additional classrooms for our first and second year students next school year. We plan to put up a second floor on our existing building for dormitories and a library. Please pray for these needs. We are grateful that the Mission (TCM) has helped us financially in the operation of the school. We have many plans to improve our building and facilities. It is only by God's grace that we can do it.

Looking forward to seeing you and company in Manila in March.

The work in the Philippines is still growing and we now have over 400 churches. We have five resident Bible schools in Ozamis, Davao, Bacolod, Cauayan and Bataan. There is also a field Bible school to train elders and several organizations in various parts of the RP. We also have one national youth organization headed by Pastor Jun Cadelina, 13 supervising ministers and about the same Youth Coordinators. Although we are on sev-

eral radio stations such as Pagadian, Cagayan, Bacolod, Bicol, Butuan and Catobato, we need to be on more.

Darlene and I have printed a good number of tracts and other literature but feel that much more can be done in this area. Several church planters have also been assigned. Both Darlene and I are getting on in age and we need younger people to come here and do the work. We are not sure how long we will last with our health and need your prayers in this regard.

Grace For Today in New York City

Grace For Today began as a radio broadcast in New York City in 1984, the only grace ministry in this city of over 7 million people. In those early years the program would be on the air for a year, then off for a year, because airtime in the nation's largest market is very expensive. Since 1994 though, Grace For Today has been on the air every week in NYC, at times even two programs each week. Several Bible classes have grown out of these radio broadcasts—in midtown Manhattan, Flushing and Jackson Heights in Queens, downtown Brooklyn, West Hempstead on Long Island, and Grace Fellowship Church in New Jersey.

On the morning of September 11 several of the believers involved in these groups were at the Trade Center.

Several were working in the towers when the planes hit and escaped before the collapse, one man walked home in shock all the way to Yonkers, a fifteen mile trip.

One of the women in the Brooklyn Bible class works at the World Financial Center across the street from the Twin Towers. On that sunny morning she was sitting on a bench in the plaza eating a bagel before going into the office. Hearing a too-low-flying jet, she looked up to see the first plane slice into the wall of the North Tower.

Another man, a NYC cabbie from Ghana and a member of the grace church in New Jersey, dropped off a fare from the airport at the World Trade Center early that morning.

One of the young men in the West Hempstead fellowship is a New York City firefighter. He was scheduled to work on September 11 but switched days off with a friend in the firehouse. His friend became one of the 343 firefighters killed when the towers collapsed.

When we started the radio ministry back in 1984, we had the idea that maybe we could reach out with the gospel of grace to some of the many ethnic groups representing almost every nation on earth living near our church in New Jersey.

Every week we give a phone number at the end of the broadcast so listeners can contact

us for literature and tapes. The first call after the first program came from a man in Brooklyn. That call grew to hundreds and now thousands of people who listen to Grace For Today each week, many have been saved, and many established in the message of grace given by the Lord to the Apostle Paul.

New York is a city where the goal of Paul's heart can actually be accomplished. I remember one day realizing, "We have a mission field at the other end of the Lincoln Tunnel. We don't need a passport or shots, we don't need to go to language school or even buy an airplane ticket. The people of the world have come to this city, and God has opened a door for us to preach the message of grace to the whole world right in this single place."

Mission Objectives

In addition to the weekly radio broadcasts our current focus in New York City is on two ministries:

1.) We're making a special effort to get a grace church established in Brooklyn. In 1984 Leon Gilchrist began to listen to Grace For Today on the radio, and after a while he trusted in the Lord as His Savior. He went with me to Manhattan every Sunday afternoon for years as we preached the grace of God at a Bible class on 34th Street in midtown. Later Leon became a board member of Grace For Today and started a Bible class himself in downtown Brooklyn—about two miles from ground zero. Now, six years later he has a cou

ple of dozen believers meeting together and seeking to turn Brooklyn up-side-down.

2.) A few years ago Grace For Today sponsored a listener call-in radio broadcast in NYC and noted that many of our listeners lacked a basic understanding of the Bible. In response to this need, Bill Minnich, one of the elders of our church in New Jersey, organized a Bible correspondence school and is offering a study course on Paul's Letter to the Romans followed by a course on Ephesians. So far nearly a thousand students have enrolled.

In addition to these ministries in New York City, Grace For Today has a website—www.gracefortoday.org— where visitors can download Bible study articles and listen to this week's Grace For Today program anywhere in the world. We get visits to the website from across the U.S. and from people in places like Ukraine, Israel, Vietnam and Iran.

They say that New York will never be the same after the events of September 11. Vivid memories of horror, of seeing people holding hands and jumping out the window on the 100th story of a burning building, have a way of changing your perspectives on life. People deal with their hurt in different ways. Crime is up, the use of drugs has increased, alcohol sales are up 25%. In the paper this week are reports of a woman who lost her husband in the disaster who has now taken her own life, and of others who are going to spiritualist mediums to try to contact their lost loved ones. But on the positive side we've seen an increase in the number of calls and letters that we receive from radio listeners—more people are listening—and a greater openness of many people to spiritual things, but mostly a deeper, more intense, more heartfelt interest.

For many of us at Grace For Today seeing the Towers collapse that day was the saddest thing we've ever seen, but an unforgettable reminder from the Lord that "the things which are seen are temporary" and that we need, now more than ever, to be living our lives for the "things which are eternal."

Project 2010 in Kenya

Our work started in rural areas and has progressed to 30 churches with an average attendance of 20 adults each. We have trained over 30 pastors in the Bible school and have an active TEE program and correspondence school. In 1999, when Joyce and I were thinking of returning to Kenya, the Lord laid on my heart Project 2010.

Project 2010 means 20 grace churches in the 10 strategic cities of Kenya by the year 2010. Our early churches have become highly dependent on the mission. After 15 years, not a single church fully supports its pastor. There are two or three self-supported pastors but basically the churches look to the mission to solve all problems. City people, on the other hand, have regular income and tend to have higher education. My belief is that strong churches in the city will be able to help support the ministry. My prayer is that if the mission and missionaries leave Kenya, the grace movement here will continue.

In line with Project 2010, the missionaries decided to spread out and start planting churches in the 10 strategic cities. Previously, all missionaries had lived in Embu, where TCM's work started.

We started the exodus by moving to Nairobi in 1999. I work with Pastor Peter Kagwi and Pastor Stanley Mwangi. We have planted two churches of which the first continues to grow with over 50 adult members. The second church has struggled and we are currently looking for ideas to help it out. The house that we have started building in the capital, will be a benefit to Project 2010 and the entire TCM ministry in Kenya.

Genesis & Verna Maraats

The Maraats moved to Kisumu immediately upon returning from the Philippines in 2000. There they worked with pastor Evanson Nyaga and Ann Wambeti. The Lord has blessed the church which now has over 50 members. Andrea however, had a lot of trouble with malaria and in December 2001 the Maraats moved to

Eldoret, which is another Project 2010 city.

Gardner & Ledith Improso

The Improsos moved to Nakuru this past summer. They have made many contacts and will start with meetings in their house. They have also been able to develop a ministry among the Indians in Nakuru. Gardner is looking forward to working with Pastor Justin Muriithi.

Carlo & Elma Paña

Carlo Paña was appointed to be the principal of the Bible school and at the same time he took over, we decided to move the Bible school to Thika, another project 2010 city. Thika is much more centrally located and the students will be able to help plant a new church there. The school just started the 2002 school year and five students have shown up. We are also looking for land near the city where the price is running between \$5000 and \$10,000 per acre. We have over \$40,000 in our account for buying land and building the Bible school.

Jessie Easterly

Shortly after the Pañas moved, we closed the school in Embu and also moved Jessie to Thika. She shares a house with the Pañas and continues to be the Correspondence Director and also helps out with the students' food.

Pastor Joshua Kithuka and Pastor Nicholas Mwendwa are working in another 2010 city called Machakos Town. Pastor Isaac Kyaalo continues to pastor in Embu Town where they have almost completed the building. That building will be of great use for conferences and seminars.

Samuel Mwangi continues as the Director of Grace Bible Church. He lives in Embu Town with his wife and four children.

In summary, we have started working in 7 of the 10 cities of Project 2010. The churches are growing and will need land in two or three years. Thank you for the gifts to this ministry for various needs. All the missionaries are behind Project 2010 and are doing their part. Please continue to pray and give for the project.

New Director in South Africa

After four years of organizing and directing the Association of Berean Grace Ministries in South Africa, Pastor Phillip du Plessis handed over the directorship to his good friend and co-laborer, Pastor Stephens Thobela. Pastor Stephens was elected into this position that became vacant because of Pastor Phillip's call to Grace Church Indianapolis. The following letter and testimony was received from Pastor Thobela.

I was raised in an apostolic church as my parents were committed members. As I grew up I started questioning certain things regarding the beliefs of this church. I would regard this church as indigenous as it is one of those churches that has combined the ancient African beliefs with the Bible. We believed in God and ancestors. We did all rituals for the ancestors and somehow they were modified to be in line with the Jewish rituals as they are in the Old Testament. As a young man I tried to find answers from the Bible. More and more I aligned myself with the pentecostal church mainly due to an influence from a cousin. In 1991, as an apprentice at the Pretoria News, I met Pastor Phillip who was the deputy foreman of my department. At this stage I was getting more involved in politics and became more rebellious towards religion and white people. Politics seemed to be providing answers. This would not be a surprise to anyone who witnessed the political situation in the country at that time. It was not making sense to be friends with this white Pastor (Phillip). To my surprise, as we started discussion about God, Christ and salvation, he invited me to his house for dinner. Interestingly, his car had ignition problems and he and I had to push start while his wife was at the wheel. I guess this was God's way of bonding us. It was my first dinner with a white family on the same table and it challenged my political

beliefs! He gave me C.R. Stam's "Things that Differ" to read and it challenged me even more! At work he persisted in following up on my progress regarding the material I was reading. He once again invited me to his house for a seminar. It was at this seminar where I gave my life to the Lord. Words cannot explain the excitement I felt deep inside. I had to share this news with my wife who was still in the apostolic church. She was a dedicated member and I did not expect her to understand the change in my life. But the excitement drove me. I started reading the Bible with her and sharing some of the things I read from the books Pastor Phillip had given me. As my wife could not read English, I had to share what I learnt with

her. I guess this is how I learnt to preach the Grace message. In the process our love and respect for each other grew! It was during this exciting period in my life when Pastor Ed Wishart, secretary of TCM, came to visit. Somehow my wife became convinced that the change in my life was genuine. I was licensed to start a church! To my surprise my wife accepted the Lord and offered to support me. The

area in which we lived was full of Pentecostal churches, so we decided to go to another area. We eventually started a church in Soshanguve, an informal settlement. The "church" was my wooden garage which I had built a week before. Our first Sunday Pastor Phillip brought his PA system to help us make the "Holy noise." Pastor Boy Ngomane (who is now a licensed pastor) later testified that this was the day God started working in his life. He did not come to "church" as he was building his shack, but he heard the whole sermon. The church grew to 80 adherences and members within 6 months. Both Pastor Phillip and I lost our jobs at Pretoria News through retrenchment. I was eventually employed with Sowetan in Johannesburg and soon Pastor Phillip followed. I moved to Soweto, but there was no Grace church, therefore I started one, also in a garage!

Learning to rightly divide the word of God was the answer in my life! I have heard Christ being preached before, but now that I have found the dispensational truth, the whole Bible makes sense. I am convinced that the answer to religious confusion is through the preaching of the Gospel, the Pauline way. I always feel very humble by the fact that God, through His Grace, has chosen me to preach His word rightly divided. He gave me a support structure, the ABGMSA, TCM, a supportive spiritual father Pastor Phillip, my forever supporting wife Linah and my son Siphos as a musician. I am convinced He has called me to preach the Cross of Christ and the risen Lord. I pray that every person who reads this testimony does not come to see me, but the mightiness of Christ in my life.

Shaping Lives for Eternity

In the 1960's, as a student of International Grace Bible Institute, Philippines, I was challenged by Dr. Lois Lebar's book, *Children in the Bible School*. The first pages state how important it is to spend much more of our time and effort in winning and training children.

Twice a week I was assigned to teach religious instruction in public schools. Little did I know that the Lord was preparing me for a lifetime of children's ministry and training others to become teachers of children. In 1967, as an intern, I was sent to Legazpi City. Again I taught religious instruction in public schools and Good News Clubs. What amazed me then and now is as Dr. Lebar said, "less time and effort are necessary to win many children to Christ." Several years after, I volunteered to start a ministry in Gen. MacArthur, Eastern Samar. Ederlina and I visited homes sharing the gospel, and passed tracts. At least three years this field was ploughed and sowed with the Word of God, but the yield was not much.

Nevertheless, it was in Samar that I realized the importance of training others to win and establish children. I asked the then director of TCM, Pastor Joseph Watkins about the idea. He replied: "Do as you think the Lord wants you to". He and his wife were very supportive. I began to travel to churches and taught Sunday School seminars. Once a year a Teachers Training Seminar was held for one month either at I.G.B.I. Ozamiz or I.G.B.I. Davao. Approximately 40 to 50 youth and adults attended these seminars so that they could go back to their churches and teach Vacation Bible School and Sunday School.

A change happened in 1976 when a pastorless church in Libon Albay, approximately 100 kilometers from

Legaspi City, requested a worker. No sooner had I arrived that I wanted to run away, due to their dilapidated building and vice-laden members. They too whispered among themselves: "What can she do, she's only a woman?" I decided to give it a try, and a young woman named Lydia offered to help and stay with me. Gradually the lives of the adult members began to change and new parents came to church. For three years Lydia and I taught SS and VBS.

I didn't quite see the fruit of this labor until I went to Indonesia as a missionary teacher in 1986. Whenever I take a vacation to the Philippines and visit the above church, it's always a delight to meet these former pupils, grown and active in various ministries.

To date I am in Jakarta, Indonesia, teaching English and American literature and Christian Education subjects in the Bible school. During vacation I travel to churches and conduct training seminars, emphasizing the importance of winning children. Above all as Dr. Lebar said, "Children have their whole lives ahead of them for service."

Growth in Indonesia in spite of trouble

The year 2001 has been troublesome politically and economically speaking. Nevertheless, the Indonesian ministry has grown and we now have churches in every province. My former BS student, Amiruddin from Ujung Pandang, wrote that his church bought him a motorcycle and now has 14 studies a week.

They plan to buy a church lot worth \$10,500 but they only have \$2,300. They have stopped renting a hotel auditorium each Sunday so they can save. Hasan, who has one more year of BS has decided to start a ministry in Tana Toraja, a well-known tourist spot in South Sulawesi. He has two Bible studies. Both Amiruddin and Hasan were former Moslems, the latter used to be a church burner in Ujung Pandang.

I'm supposed to go to Blitar to speak at a youth conference but unfortunately all train tickets have been sold out. Ironically last December 24 and 25 two trains from Surabaya to Jakarta collided, a train to Blitar derailed and another hit a car on a crossroad. I could have been in one had I bought a ticket.

Throughout these years of teaching at U.K.I. it's encouraging to see some of my former students active in the ministry. Yunita works as a Bible translator with S.I.L. in Irian Jaya.
